Digital Safeguarding Policy



1. Scope of the Policy

This policy applies to all members of the *academy* community (including staff, students / pupils, volunteers, parents / carers, visitors, community users) who have access to and are users of academy ICT systems, both in and out of the *academy*.

The Education and Inspections Act 2006 empowers Headteachers / Principals to such extent as is reasonable, to regulate the behaviour of students / pupils when they are off the *academy* site and empowers members of staff to impose disciplinary penalties for inappropriate behaviour. This is pertinent to incidents of cyber-bullying, or other Digital Safeguarding incidents covered by this policy, which may take place outside of the academy, but is linked to membership of the academy. The 2011 Education Act increased these powers with regard to the searching for and of electronic devices and the deletion of data (see appendix for template policy). In the case of both acts, action can only be taken over issues covered by the published Behaviour Policy.

The *academy* will deal with such incidents within this policy and associated behaviour and anti-bullying policies and will, where known, inform parents / carers of incidents of inappropriate Digital Safeguarding behaviour that take place out of school.

2. Roles and Responsibilities

The following section outlines the Digital Safeguarding roles and responsibilities of individuals and groups within the Trust:

2.1. Trust Digital Safeguarding Team:

The Digital Safeguarding Team provides a consultative group that has wide representation from the Trust community, with responsibility for issues regarding Digital Safeguarding and the monitoring the Digital Safeguarding policy including the impact of initiatives.

Members of the Digital Safeguarding Team will assist the Digital Safeguarding Coordinator at each academy with:

- •support the Digital Safeguarding Coordinators in their role, with particular emphasis on sharing good practice and regular review using the 360 degree safe tool.
- •provide strategic direction to trust policy in regards to Digital Safeguarding
- •mapping and reviewing the Digital Safeguarding curricular provision ensuring relevance, breadth and progression
- monitoring network / internet / incident logs
- •consulting stakeholders including parents / carers and the students / pupils about the Digital Safeguarding provision
- •monitoring improvement actions identified through use of the 360 degree safe self review tool

2.2. Hub Council / Board of Directors:

The Trust Board are responsible for the approval of the Digital Safeguarding Policy. The Trust Digital Safeguarding team will review the effectiveness of the policy annually. Each Safeguarding Hub Councillor will oversee Digital Safeguarding within their hub.

2.3. Headteachers/Heads of School:

- The Headteacher / Head of School has a duty of care for ensuring the safety (including Digital Safeguarding) of members of the school community, though the day to day responsibility for Digital Safeguarding will be delegated to the Digital Safeguarding Co-ordinator.
- The Headteacher/Head of School and (at least) another member of the Senior Leadership Team / Senior Management Team should be aware of the procedures to be followed in the event of a serious Digital Safeguarding allegation being made against a member of staff. (see flow chart on dealing with Digital Safeguarding incidents included in a later section "Responding to incidents of misuse" and relevant Trust disciplinary procedures).
- The Headteacher / Head of School is responsible for ensuring that the Digital Safeguarding Coordinator and other relevant staff receive suitable training to enable them to carry out their Digital Safeguarding roles and to train other colleagues, as relevant.
- The Senior Leadership Team / Senior Management Team will receive regular monitoring reports from the Digital Safeguarding Co-ordinator .

2.4. Digital Safeguarding Coordinator:

Each academy will have a Digital Safeguarding Coordinator. In most cases, this will form part of the role of the Computing coordinator.

takes day to day responsibility for digital safeguarding issues

Utilises the 360 safe tool to measure impact of the Digital Safeguarding measures in place at the academy

- ensures that all staff are aware of the procedures that need to be followed in the event of an Digital Safeguarding incident taking place.
- liaises with the Trust Digital Safeguarding team to get information, review current provision and arrange training.
- liaises with the Trust IT team
- receives reports of Digital Safeguarding incidents and creates a log of incidents to inform future Digital Safeguarding developments.

2.5. Aspire IT Team:

The Aspire IT team is responsible for ensuring:

- that the academy's technical infrastructure is secure and is not open to misuse or malicious attack
- that users may only access the networks and devices through a properly enforced password protection policy, in which passwords are regularly changed
- that they keep up to date with Digital Safeguarding technical information in order to effectively carry out their Digital Safeguarding role and to inform and update others as relevant
- that the use of trust IT systems is regularly monitored in order that any misuse / attempted misuse can be reported to the Headteacher / Head of School / Digital Safeguarding Coordinator for investigation / action / sanction
- that monitoring software / systems are implemented and updated as agreed in academy policies

2.6. Teaching and Support Staff

are responsible for ensuring that:

• they have an up to date awareness of Digital Safeguarding matters and of the current *academy*Digital Safeguarding policy and practices

- they have read, understood and signed the Staff Acceptable Use Policy / Agreement (AUP)
- they report any suspected misuse or problem to the *Headteacher / Principal / Senior Leader ; Digital Safeguarding Coordinator*) for investigation / action / sanction
- all digital communications with students / pupils / parents / carers should be on a professional level and only carried out using official school systems
- Digital Safeguarding issues are embedded in all aspects of the curriculum and other activities
- students / pupils understand and follow the Digital Safeguarding and acceptable use policies
- students / pupils have a good understanding of research skills and the need to avoid plagiarism and uphold copyright regulations
- they monitor the use of digital technologies, mobile devices, cameras etc in lessons and other school activities (where allowed) and implement current policies with regard to these devices
- in lessons where internet use is pre-planned younger pupils should be guided to sites checked as suitable for their use and that processes are in place for dealing with any unsuitable material that is found in internet searches. Older pupils will be supported in using the internet independently.

2.7. Child Protection / Safeguarding Designated Person

should be trained in Digital Safeguarding issues and be aware of the potential for serious child protection / safeguarding issues to arise from:

- sharing of personal data
- access to illegal / inappropriate materials
- inappropriate on-line contact with adults / strangers
- potential or actual incidents of grooming
- cyber-bullying

2.8. Students / pupils:

- are responsible for using the academy digital technology systems in accordance with the Student / Pupil Acceptable Use Policy
- have a good understanding of research skills and the need to avoid plagiarism and uphold copyright regulations
- need to understand the importance of reporting abuse, misuse or access to inappropriate materials and know how to do so
- will be expected to know and understand policies on the use of mobile devices and digital cameras. They should also know and understand policies on the taking / use of images and on cyber-bullying.
- should understand the importance of adopting good Digital Safeguarding practice when using digital technologies out of school and realise that the *school's / academy's* Digital Safeguarding Policy covers their actions out of school, if related to their membership of the school

2.9. Parents / Carers

Parents / Carers play a crucial role in ensuring that their children understand the need to use the internet / mobile devices in an appropriate way. The *academy* will take every opportunity to help parents understand these issues through *parents' evenings, newsletters, letters, website / VLE and information about national / local Digital Safeguarding campaigns / literature.* Parents and carers will be encouraged to support the *academy* in promoting good Digital Safeguarding practice and to follow guidelines on the appropriate use of:

- digital and video images taken at school events
- access to parents' sections of the website / VLE and on-line student / pupil records
- their children's personal devices in the academy (where this is allowed)



3. Policy Statements

3.1. Education – students / pupils

Whilst regulation and technical solutions are very important, their use must be balanced by educating *students* / *pupils* to take a responsible approach. The education of *students* / *pupils* in Digital Safeguarding is therefore an essential part of the school's Digital Safeguarding provision. Children and young people need the help and support of the school to recognise and avoid Digital Safeguarding risks and build their resilience.

Digital Safeguarding should be a focus in all areas of the curriculum and staff should reinforce Digital Safeguarding messages across the curriculum. The Digital Safeguarding curriculum should be broad, relevant and provide progression, with opportunities for creative activities and will be provided in the following ways:

- A planned Digital Safeguarding curriculum should be provided as part of Computing / PHSE / other lessons and should be regularly revisited
- Key Digital Safeguarding messages should be reinforced as part of a planned programme of assemblies and tutorial / pastoral activities
- Students / pupils should be taught in all lessons to be critically aware of the materials / content they access on-line and be guided to validate the accuracy of information.
- Students / pupils should be taught to acknowledge the source of information used and to respect copyright when using material accessed on the internet
- Students / pupils should be helped to understand the need for the student / pupil Acceptable Use Agreement and encouraged to adopt safe and responsible use both within and outside school
- Staff should act as good role models in their use of digital technologies the internet and mobile devices
- in lessons where internet use is pre-planned, it is best practice that students / pupils should be guided to sites checked as suitable for their use and that processes are in place for dealing with any unsuitable material that is found in internet searches.
- Where students / pupils are allowed to freely search the internet, staff should be vigilant in monitoring the content of the websites the young people visit.

3.2 Education – parents / carers

Many parents and carers have only a limited understanding of Digital Safeguarding risks and issues, yet they play an essential role in the education of their children and in the monitoring / regulation of the children's on-line behaviours. Parents may underestimate how often children and young people come across potentially harmful and inappropriate material on the internet and may be unsure about how to respond.

The school will therefore seek to provide information and awareness to parents and carers through:

- Curriculum activities
- Letters, newsletters, web site, VLE
- Parents / Carers evenings / sessions
- High profile events / campaigns eg Safer Internet Day
- Reference to the relevant web sites / publications eg <u>www.swgfl.org.uk</u> <u>www.saferinternet.org.uk/</u> http://www.childnet.com/parents-and-carers



3.3 Education – The Wider Community

The academy will provide opportunities for local community groups / members of the community to gain from the school's / academy's Digital Safeguarding knowledge and experience. This may be offered through the following:

- Providing family learning courses in use of new digital technologies, digital literacy and Digital Safeguarding
- Digital Safeguarding messages targeted towards the whole family.
- The academy website will provide Digital Safeguarding information for the wider community
- Supporting community groups eg Early Years Settings, Childminders, youth / sports / voluntary groups to enhance their Digital Safeguarding provision

3.4 Education & Training – Staff / Volunteers

It is essential that all staff receive Digital Safeguarding training and understand their responsibilities, as outlined in this policy. Training will be offered as follows:

- A planned programme of formal Digital Safeguarding training will be made available to staff. This will be regularly updated and reinforced. An audit of the Digital Safeguarding training needs of all staff will be carried out regularly. It is expected that some staff will identify Digital Safeguarding as a training need within the performance management process.
- All new staff should receive Digital Safeguarding training as part of their induction programme, ensuring that they fully understand the school Digital Safeguarding policy and Acceptable Use Agreements.
- The Digital Safeguarding Coordinator (or other nominated person) will receive regular updates through attendance at external training events (eg from SWGfL / LA / other relevant organisations) and by reviewing guidance documents released by relevant organisations.
- This Digital Safeguarding policy and its updates will be presented to and discussed by staff in staff / team meetings / INSET days.
- The Digital Safeguarding Coordinator (or other nominated person) will provide advice / guidance / training to individuals as required.

4. Technical – infrastructure / equipment, filtering and monitoring

The Trust will be responsible for ensuring that the academy infrastructure / network is as safe and secure as is reasonably possible and that policies and procedures approved within this policy are implemented. It will also need to ensure that the relevant people named in the above sections will be effective in carrying out their Digital Safeguarding responsibilities:

- Academy technical systems will be managed in ways that ensure that the academy meets recommended technical requirements
- There will be regular reviews and audits of the safety and security of school academy technical systems
- All users will have clearly defined access rights to academy technical systems and devices.
- All users at KS2 and above will be provided with a username and secure password by the Trust IT team
 who will keep an up to date record of users and their usernames. Users are responsible for the security
 of their username and password. Academies may choose to use group or class log-ons and passwords
 for KS1 and below.
- Internet access is filtered for all users. Illegal content (child sexual abuse images) is filtered by the broadband or filtering provider by actively employing the Internet Watch Foundation CAIC list. Content

lists are regularly updated and internet use is logged and regularly monitored.. There is a clear process in place to deal with requests for filtering changes

- The school has provided enhanced / differentiated user-level filtering
- academy technical staff regularly monitor and record the activity of users on the school technical systems and users are made aware of this in the Acceptable Use Agreement.
- An appropriate system is in place for users to report any actual / potential technical incident / security breach to the relevant person, as agreed).
- Appropriate security measures are in place to protect the servers, firewalls, routers, wireless systems, work stations, mobile devices etc from accidental or malicious attempts which might threaten the security of the school systems and data. These are tested regularly. The school infrastructure and individual workstations are protected by up to date virus software.
- An agreed policy is in place for the provision of temporary access of "guests" (eg trainee teachers, supply teachers, visitors) onto the school systems.
- The Staff Acceptable Usage Agreement forbids staff from downloading executable files and installing programmes on school devices.
- An agreed policy is in place (Staff Acceptable Usage Agreement) regarding the use of removable media (eg memory sticks / CDs / DVDs) by users on school devices. Personal data cannot be sent over the internet or taken off the school site unless safely encrypted.

5. Bring Your Own Device (BYOD)

The educational opportunities offered by mobile technologies are being expanded as a wide range of devices, software and online services become available for teaching and learning, within and beyond the classroom. This has led to the exploration by schools of users bringing their own technologies in order to provide a greater freedom of choice and usability. However, there are a number of Digital Safeguarding considerations for BYOD that need to be reviewed prior to implementing such a policy. Use of BYOD should not introduce vulnerabilities into existing secure environments. Considerations will need to include; levels of secure access, filtering, data protection, storage and transfer of data, mobile device management systems, training, support, acceptable use, auditing and monitoring. This list is not exhaustive and a BYOD policy should be in place and reference made within all relevant policies.

- The school has a set of clear expectations and responsibilities for all users
- The school adheres to the Data Protection Act principles
- All users are provided with and accept the Acceptable Use Agreement
- All network systems are secure and access for users is differentiated
- Where possible these devices will be covered by the school's / academy's normal filtering systems, while being used on the premises
- All users will use their username and password and keep this safe
- Mandatory training is undertaken for all staff
- Students / Pupils receive training and guidance on the use of personal devices
- Regular audits and monitoring of usage will take place to ensure compliance
- Any device loss, theft, change of ownership of the device will be reported as in the BYOD policy
- Any user leaving the school will follow the process outlined within the BYOD policy

6. Use of digital and video images

The development of digital imaging technologies has created significant benefits to learning, allowing staff and students / pupils instant use of images that they have recorded themselves or downloaded from the internet. However, staff, parents / carers and students / pupils need to be aware of the risks associated with publishing digital

images on the internet. Such images may provide avenues for cyberbullying to take place. Digital images may remain available on the internet forever and may cause harm or embarrassment to individuals in the short or longer term. It is common for employers to carry out internet searches for information about potential and existing employees. The school will inform and educate users about these risks and will implement policies to reduce the likelihood of the potential for harm:

- When using digital images, staff should inform and educate students / pupils about the risks associated with the taking, use, sharing, publication and distribution of images. In particular they should recognise the risks attached to publishing their own images on the internet eg on social networking sites.
 - In accordance with guidance from the Information Commissioner's Office, parents / carers are welcome to take videos and digital images of their children at school events for their own personal use (as such use in not covered by the Data Protection Act). To respect everyone's privacy and in some cases protection, these images should not be published / made publicly available on social networking sites, nor should parents / carers comment on any activities involving other *students* / *pupils* in the digital / video images.
 - Staff and volunteers are allowed to take digital / video images to support educational aims, but must follow school policies concerning the sharing, distribution and publication of those images. Those images should only be taken on school equipment, the personal equipment of staff should not be used for such purposes.
 - Care should be taken when taking digital / video images that students / pupils are appropriately dressed and are not participating in activities that might bring the individuals or the school into disrepute.
 - Students / pupils must not take, use, share, publish or distribute images of others without their permission
 - Photographs published on the website, or elsewhere that include students / pupils will be selected carefully and will comply with good practice guidance on the use of such images.
 - Students' / Pupils' full names will not be used anywhere on a website or blog, particularly in association with photographs.
 - Written permission from parents or carers will be obtained before photographs of students / pupils are published on the school website
 - Student's / Pupil's work can only be published with the permission of the student / pupil and parents or carers.

7. Data Protection

Personal data will be recorded, processed, transferred and made available according to the Data Protection Act 1998 which states that personal data must be:

- Fairly and lawfully processed
- Processed for limited purposes
- Adequate, relevant and not excessive
- Accurate
- Kept no longer than is necessary
- Processed in accordance with the data subject's rights
- Secure
- Only transferred to others with adequate protection.

The academy must ensure that:

- It will hold the minimum personal data necessary to enable it to perform its function and it will not hold it for longer than necessary for the purposes it was collected for.
- Every effort will be made to ensure that data held is accurate, up to date and that inaccuracies are corrected without unnecessary delay.

- All personal data will be fairly obtained in accordance with the "Privacy Notice" and lawfully
 processed in accordance with the "Conditions for Processing".
- It has a Data Protection Policy
- It is registered as a Data Controller for the purposes of the Data Protection Act (DPA)
- Responsible persons are appointed / identified Senior Information Risk Officer (SIRO) and Information Asset Owners (IAOs)
- Risk assessments are carried out
- It has clear and understood arrangements for the security, storage and transfer of personal data
- Data subjects have rights of access and there are clear procedures for this to be obtained
- There are clear and understood policies and routines for the deletion and disposal of data
- There is a policy for reporting, logging, managing and recovering from information risk incidents
- There are clear Data Protection clauses in all contracts where personal data may be passed to third parties
- There are clear policies about the use of cloud storage / cloud computing which ensure that such data storage meets the requirements laid down by the Information Commissioner's Office.

Staff must ensure that they:

- At all times take care to ensure the safe keeping of personal data, minimising the risk of its loss or misuse.
- Use personal data only on secure password protected computers and other devices, ensuring that they are properly "logged-off" at the end of any session in which they are using personal data.
- Transfer data using encryption and secure password protected devices.
- Use Microsoft Onedrive as a means of sharing personal information within the organisation.
- · Ensure that encrypted email is used when sending personal information out of the organisation.

When personal data is stored on any portable computer system, memory stick or any other removable media:

- the data must be encrypted and password protected
- the device must be password protected
- the device must offer approved virus and malware checking software
- the data must be securely deleted from the device, in line with school policy (below) once it has been transferred or its use is complete

8. Communications

A wide range of rapidly developing communications technologies has the potential to enhance learning. The following table shows how the school currently considers the benefit of using these technologies for education outweighs their risks / disadvantages:

When using communication technologies the school considers the following as good practice:

- The official academy email service may be regarded as safe and secure and is monitored. Users should be aware that email communications are monitored. Staff and students / pupils should therefore use only the academy email service to communicate with others when in school, or on academy systems (eg by remote access).
- Users must immediately report, to the nominated person in accordance with the academy policy, the receipt of any communication that makes them feel uncomfortable, is offensive, discriminatory, threatening or bullying in nature and must not respond to any such communication.
- Any digital communication between staff and students / pupils or parents / carers (email, chat, VLE etc) must be professional in tone and content. These communications may only take place on official (monitored) academy systems. Personal email addresses, text messaging or social media must not be used for these communications.
- Whole class / group email addresses may be used at KS1, while students / pupils at KS2 and above may
 be provided with individual academy email addresses for educational use when appropriate. All email
 systems will be closely monitored by academy staff
- Students / pupils should be taught about Digital Safeguarding issues, such as the risks attached to the sharing of personal details. They should also be taught strategies to deal with inappropriate communications and be reminded of the need to communicate appropriately when using digital technologies.



 Personal information should not be posted on the academy website and only official email addresses should be used to identify members of staff.

9. Social Media - Protecting Professional Identity

All schools, academies and local authorities have a duty of care to provide a safe learning environment for pupils and staff. Schools/academies and local authorities could be held responsible, indirectly for acts of their employees in the course of their employment. Staff members who harass, cyberbully, discriminate on the grounds of sex, race or disability or who defame a third party may render the *academy* or local authority liable to the injured party. Reasonable steps to prevent predictable harm must be in place.

The school provides the following measures to ensure reasonable steps are in place to minimise risk of harm to pupils, staff and the school through limiting access to personal information:

- Training to include: acceptable use; social media risks; checking of settings; data protection; reporting issues. Clear reporting guidance, including responsibilities, procedures and sanctions
- Risk assessment, including legal risk

School staff should ensure that:

- No reference should be made in social media to students / pupils, parents / carers or school staff
- They do not engage in online discussion on personal matters relating to members of the school community
- Personal opinions should not be attributed to the academy or local authority
- Security settings on personal social media profiles are regularly checked to minimise risk of loss of personal information.

The *school's / academy's* use of social media for professional purposes will be checked regularly by the senior risk officer and Digital Safeguarding committee to ensure compliance with the Social Media, Data Protection, Communications, Digital Image and Video Policies.



10. Unsuitable / inappropriate activities

The school believes that the activities referred to in the following section would be inappropriate in a school context and that users, as defined below, should not engage in these activities in school or outside school when using school equipment or systems. The school policy restricts usage as follows:



11. Responding to incidents of misuse

It is hoped that all members of the Trust community will be responsible users of digital technologies, who understand and follow Trust policy. However, there may be times when infringements of the policy could take place, through careless or irresponsible or, very rarely, through deliberate misuse. Please use the flow diagram below to plan the response to an incident.





In the event of suspicion, all steps in this procedure should be followed:

• Have more than one senior member of staff / volunteer involved in this process. This is vital to protect individuals if accusations are subsequently reported.

- Conduct the procedure using a designated computer that will not be used by young people and if
 necessary can be taken off site by the police should the need arise. Use the same computer for the
 duration of the procedure.
- It is important to ensure that the relevant staff should have appropriate internet access to conduct the procedure, but also that the sites and content visited are closely monitored and recorded (to provide further protection).
- Record the url of any site containing the alleged misuse and describe the nature of the content causing concern. It may also be necessary to record and store screenshots of the content on the machine being used for investigation. These may be recorded using the Trust incident logging system.
- Once this has been completed and fully investigated the group will need to judge whether this concern has substance or not. If it does then appropriate action will be required and could include the following:
 - Internal response or discipline procedures
 - Involvement by Local Authority or national / local organisation (as relevant).
 - Police involvement and/or action
- If content being reviewed includes images of Child abuse then the monitoring should be halted and referred to the Police immediately. Other instances to report to the police would include:
 - incidents of 'grooming' behaviour
 - the sending of obscene materials to a child
 - adult material which potentially breaches the Obscene Publications Act
 - criminally racist material
 - other criminal conduct, activity or materials
- Isolate the computer in question as best you can. Any change to its state may hinder a later police investigation.

It is important that all of the above steps are taken as they will provide an evidence trail for the *academy* and possibly the police and demonstrate that visits to these sites were carried out for child protection purposes. The completed incident log should be retained by the group for evidence and reference purposes.

11.1 Academy Actions & Sanctions

It is more likely that the academy will need to deal with incidents that involve inappropriate rather than illegal misuse. It is important that any incidents are dealt with as soon as possible in a proportionate manner, and that members of the school community are aware that incidents have been dealt with. It is intended that incidents of misuse will be dealt with through normal behaviour / disciplinary procedures as follows:
