


Dear parents and carers,

Online Learning update

TOP TIPS

7 top tips to support reading at home

Shared reading is a great way to develop children's language and communication and to boost their reading skills. Regular reading routines can offer lots of opportunities for learning during school closures. On Wednesday we emailed information on how to access free e-books through the BorrowBox app. If your child prefers reading from a physical book, look out for an email next Monday with details of how your child can borrow books from the **school library** during lockdown.

- 1) Concentrate on reading quality (it isn't all about reading lots!)
- 2) Ask your child lots of questions
- 3) Ask your child to make predictions about what they have read
- 4) Ask your child to summarise what they have read
- 5) Ask your child to write about what they have read
- 6) Read and discuss reading with friends or family
- 7) Maintain the motivation to read.

Critical Worker places in school

We are experiencing an extremely high demand for critical worker places. We ask that parents/carers DO NOT use a critical worker place if there is another adult at home, even if you are entitled to. The national lockdown is intended to minimise community transmission. It will not do this if parents send their children to school just because they can.

Critical worker provision is ONLY for parents who have NO OTHER CHILDCARE OPTION. Using this provision if another option is available will mean that someone who is in need may be struggling to provide care for their child. It also means it will take longer for us to come out of lockdown, as transmission will be higher than it needs to be.

Parents are asked to consider others and ONLY use their local school service if it is imperative to do so. Please refer to the National Lockdown guidance below for more information about critical worker roles: <u>https://www.gov.uk/guidance/national-lockdown-stay-at-home</u>

For your information, Aspire Academy Trust will allocate spaces to pupils according to the following categories:

- 1. Significantly vulnerable children (CP, CIC, EHCP)
- 2. Other vulnerable children
- 3. Both parents/carers or single parent/carer are critical workers
- 4. One parent is a critical worker
